Separate and Unequal

WHY WE ARE DEMONSTRATING

Disabled People Against Apartheid (DPAA) have organised this demonstration to protest at the participation of a South African team in the International Stoke Mandeville Games for disabled athletes.

Able bodied S.A. teams are banned from virtually all countries of the world because of its Government's policies of apartheid. Apartheid means that 20 million black South Africans (nearly 90% of the population) have **no vote** in the land of their birth.

BAN ALL SOUTH AFRICAN TEAMS

The British Government is committed to the Gleneagles Agreement which debar sporting contact between British teams and South Africa. It accepts that the ban should apply to disabled and able-bodied sport **equally**. The Sports Council does not give grant aid to the Stoke Mandeville Games because of South African involvement.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

- raise the issue at your sports club, with your local council, through your trade union or your Coalition/Organisation of Disabled People;
- write to the President, International Stoke Mandeville Games Federation, Sports Stadium, Harvey road, Aylesbury, Bucks, demanding that South Africa be excluded;
- If possible, send a copy of your letter to D.P.A.A.;
- Join the demonstration in solidarity with black disabled South Africans outside Stoke Mandeville Sports Stadium on
